

The Village Transportation Plan: Walking and Biking in the Village of Eagle

Over the last year, the Township's Village Concept Committee guided development of the Village Transportation Plan for the Village of Eagle. The Village Transportation Plan presents improvement concepts to connect the bicycle and pedestrian network, provide a consistent streetscape, and support businesses and economic development in Eagle. The Plan proposes new sidewalk and trail connections specifically along Pottstown Pike between Graphite Mine Road to the north and Pennsylvania Drive to the south and along Little Conestoga Road within the heart of the Village. The concept plan also includes medians, mid-block crosswalks and driveway reconfigurations to create a safe and comfortable environment for walking and biking. Additionally, a key focus of the project was the northern gateway to the Village, including the intersections of Pottstown Pike, Graphite Mine Road and Darrell Drive. Several alternatives were developed for these intersections, which include a combination of traffic signals, roundabouts and roadway realignments.

Throughout the planning process, the Township coordinated with PennDOT, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission and the Chester County Planning Commission on technical aspects of the plan. Additionally, the Township held four stakeholder meetings specifically for business and property owners within the Village. Representatives from twenty different businesses attended the meetings to review draft plans and provide input. The improvements identified in the plan will be implemented in a phased approach over time, depending on the availability of funding and other factors. A key next step for the project is identifying potential funding sources and other opportunities to implement the improvements. The Township will continue to coordinate with residents and stakeholders as funding is secured and improvements are designed and constructed.

The Village Transportation Plan is available for review and comment on the Township's website.

Boards, Authorities, Commissions & Officials

Pennsylvania counties are divided into four principal types of municipalities — cities, boroughs and townships of the first and second class — with each kind operating under a different code of State Laws. Chester County has one city (Coatesville), 15 boroughs, one township of the first class (Caln) and 56 townships of the second class.

In 1858, when the original Uwchlan Township was divided into Uwchlan and Upper Uwchlan, the present Upper Uwchlan Township was incorporated as a township of the second class. As such, it is permitted to elect and appoint certain officials. Elected officials are Supervisors, Auditors and Tax Collector. Each group is independent of the others.

Additionally, elected officials who represent Upper Uwchlan, as well as other Municipalities, are: School Director, District Justice, Constable and your Federal, State and County Representatives.

Finance Department News:




This is a reminder that Refuse/recycling and Sewer billing has been brought in-house; our Finance Department now processes all payments. These are utility payments due to a municipality, therefore municipal liens can be placed on your property if not paid within a certain period of time. We would appreciate separate checks for refuse and sewer payments.

Refuse/recycling: Checks should be made payable to Upper Uwchlan Township. This is an annual utility fee and can be paid in a lump sum payment prior to September 30, 2014 or it can be split in two payments. If you choose to pay in two separate installments, the account must be paid in full no later than September 30, 2014. If payment is received after that date, you will be charged a 10% late fee. Please include your account number on your check and please do not staple the check to the remittance advice. *(The Marsh Harbor and The Mews at Byers Station residents are not billed through Township for trash services as this is included in their HOA fees).*

Sewer: Checks should be made payable to UUTMA. This is a quarterly utility bill and is billed as a flat quarterly fee. Please ensure payment is paid to UUTMA as this is a separate account from the trash account. Please include your account number on your check and please do not staple the check to the remittance advice. If you want to pay through "bill pay" with your bank, PLEASE make sure your sewer payments are payable to UUTMA and **NOT** Upper Uwchlan Township as this delays processing and could be applied to your trash account in error. Include your township account number on your online payment; both sewer and trash have the same account number.

Storm Water Pollution Solutions

Lawn Care

Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. In addition, yard clippings and leaves can wash into storm drains and contribute nutrients and organic matter to streams.

- ✓ Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- ✓ Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- ✓ Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams.
- ✓ Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used in landscaping projects.



Pet Waste

Pet waste can be a major source of bacteria and excess nutrients in local waters. When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local waterways.

Storm Water Management

Did you know:

- Starting in 2014 new regulations were put in place regarding storm water
- Every project involving earth moving is subject to storm water management
- Projects over 1500 square feet of impervious area now require a storm water plan
- Projects under 1500 square feet will be applied to a cumulative total to be added to future projects

What is the purpose of Storm Water Management?

- To reduce the magnitude storm water impacts on property and infrastructure
- Provide infiltration and maintain natural groundwater recharge
- Minimize the volume of storm water generated and release storm water as close to the source of runoff as possible
- Reduce erosion and sedimentation of stream channels
- Improve the overall quality of storm water runoff before it reaches our streams and tributaries

How do I manage Storm Water?

- Construct a rain garden
- On a small project, rain barrels or a seepage bed may be all that's required
- Allow roof leaders and drainage pipes to discharge onto lawn or other natural surface instead of piping it directly to a drainage system. This will allow any sediments or pollutants to be filtered out prior to reaching the system
- Maintain any storm water management systems which exist or are constructed on your property. This includes any pipes, storm water inlets, seepage beds, or basins. Maintaining these systems is crucial for the protection of the environment as well as your property

The Township provides one (1) 96-gallon wheeled container for trash and one (1) 64-gallon wheeled container for recycling. These are to be used as the PRIMARY container for trash/recycling collection.

The carts are easy to maneuver and have hinged lids to prevent blowing litter, reduce odors and keep pests out. The carts are township property and should be left at properties should you move. The goal is to increase recycling participation and reduce solid waste costs.

Compost Lawn and Leaf Collection:

(17 collections annually - Wednesdays)

Seventeen (17) yard waste (including grass clippings) and leaf collections will occur throughout the year. Use your open containers (no lids) or Biodegradable Bags for leaf and yard waste disposal. Biodegradable bags are available at the Township Office for \$2.50/5-bag bundle. Leaf and yard waste debris placed in plastic bags will NOT be collected; this material is destined for the composting process.

New Electronics Recycling Law!

Televisions, computers, monitors, laptops, etc. are no longer permitted to be disposed of with your household trash. A new State law, effective January 24, 2013, requires these items to be recycled. One recycling option is to contact the Stores where these electronics are typically purchased. Another disposal option is Chester County's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Events, which will now include electronics waste (E-Waste). For detailed information visit www.dep.state.pa.us, menu item "Waste" or contact DEP's Recycling Hotline (800) 346-4242.

Acceptable E-Waste:

CPUs/Laptop Computers, Monitors, Printers, CRT TVs, Non-CRT TVs, Cell Phones, Microwaves, Radios, Toner/Ink Cartridges, DVD/VCR Players, etc.

Not Acceptable:

Explosives & Ammunition, Household Batteries, Tires, Appliances with Freon, Used Motor Oil, Latex Paint, Unidentified Waste, Smoke Detectors

Holidays:

If your scheduled collection day falls upon a Holiday, your pick up will be the next day. Check website for trash holidays.

Bulk Trash:

Chairs, toys, mattresses, small sofas, bed frames, bicycles. Appliances – DOORS MUST BE REMOVED FROM ALL APPLIANCES. Township toter must be out with bulk item(s).

Freon Items:

Please call the Township Office at 610-458-9400 to schedule pick-up of freon containing items such as refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, and dehumidifiers.

Township Parks now Equipped with AED: Automated External Defibrillator

Three township parks; Hickory Park, Fellowship Field and Larkins Park, are now equipped with AED thanks to the efforts and generosity of Aiden's Heart Foundation and township resident Tom Greybill, on behalf of the GEYA Executive Board. The AED units are the latest, safest units available.

Today's AED technology allows ANY average bystander (even kids!) to successfully and appropriately use the equipment to save a life. Not only do the machines have voice prompts that walk you through the process and tell you exactly what to do, many machines are now fully automatic, meaning you do NOT have to press a button to deliver a shock. You, therefore CANNOT HURT SOMEONE by trying to use an AED; the machine reads the heart rhythm (or lack thereof) in the victim and determines both the frequency and the energy of the shock to deliver, if needed. Regarding liability, the Good Samaritan Law protects ANY individual, even off-duty medical professionals, who act in good faith while using an AED to save a person's life.

An AED is the ONLY way to restart a heart in cardiac arrest. If you see a person collapse and he/she is unresponsive, not breathing normally, and you cannot detect a pulse, follow the Chain of Survival: 1) Call 911, 2) Send someone to get the AED, 3) Begin hands-only CPR, and then 4) Apply the AED per instruction given by voice prompts.

Etiquette for Using Trails

What is proper trail etiquette? A quick look into our township ordinances provides a great summary (Ord. #07-08, Appendix A, *Recommended Guidelines for Township Trail Usage*).



- Be courteous to other trail users.
- Stay to the right except to pass. When passing, give a warning such as “on your left” or a bell or horn. *(This is not only courteous because those being passed may not hear the person approaching and be startled, but is self-preservation, too. A warning keeps someone from inadvertently changing direction into your path, causing injury to you both).*
- Alert others if you stop and move off the trail surface if you stop or slow down quickly *(if on a bicycle, use hand signals to alert others of your intentions).*
- Respect the privacy and property rights of others.

BICYCLISTS

- Yield to pedestrians *(assume they will not hear you approach – WARN them – look to see if they are wearing headphones).*
- Ride at a safe speed *(15 mph is recommended; faster than that, you need to be on the road).*
- Ride in a single line *(see the first guideline, above).*
- **HELMETS ARE RECOMMENDED AND ARE REQUIRED BY STATE LAW FOR THOSE UNDER 12.**
Do Not Let Your Children Ride Without a Helmet!

PEDESTRIANS

- Expect to be passed from behind.
