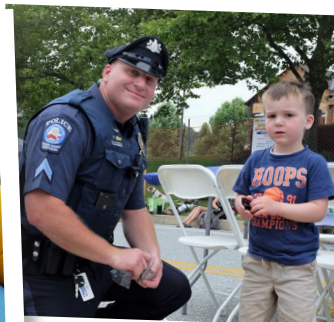

Hickory Park Temporary Closure

Capital plans for the Pennsylvania Turnpike include widening and reconstructing the toll road. In anticipation of that reconstruction, the PA Turnpike Commission is requiring TC Energy to relocate a 14" natural gas pipeline that runs beneath the Turnpike and bisects Upper Uwchlan Township's Hickory Park. The line is currently several feet below ground but will be re-located within the same right of way approximately 25 feet deeper. The relocation will be achieved by horizontal directional drilling (HDD). The relocation will necessitate a temporary closure of Hickory Park to the public. This closure will last through the beginning of April, barring any unforeseen delays. Park user groups have been notified of the planned closure. Upper Uwchlan Township has coordinated with TC Energy to minimize the impact on Township facilities and establish temporary workspace plans. No work will take place on the surface of the playing fields within the fenced areas. At the conclusion of the project, any parking lot area utilized by the contractor will be re-paved; any green or landscaped areas will be re-seeded and restored. All compensation provided to the Township for the temporary workspace will be re-invested in Upper Uwchlan Township parks.

Recycle Right!

Curbside Single Stream Recycling

Toss these items directly into your Recycling Toter. **DO NOT** use plastic bags.

PAPER Newspapers, cardboard, paper bags, magazines and junk mail, phone books, home/office paper, paper egg cartons, rinsed milk and juice cartons, clean pizza boxes, and boxboard food packaging. Break down and flatten.



PLASTIC Containers marked #1—#5 and #7. Throw away caps and lids. Rinse thoroughly.



METAL Food and drink cans, pie plates, clean aluminum foil. Rinse thoroughly. Empty aerosol cans.



GLASS Clean food and drink bottles and jars. Throw away lids. Rinse thoroughly.

TRASH Food waste; light bulbs; mirrors, plate glass, window glass, drinkware and crystal; ceramic cups and plates, flower pots, ovenware; caps/lids from recyclable containers; empty paint cans, empty oil cans and bottles; plastic food wrappers, plastic bags; wax or plastic coated boxes/paper, plastic and Tyvek envelopes; straws, tissues, towels, napkins, plasticware; Styrofoam/polystyrene; shoes and clothing; metallic wrapping paper.

NOTE: ALL BOX SPRINGS and MATTRESSES MUST be placed in plastic bags and put out at curbside the night before a Bulk collection day. If they are not in plastic bags, they WILL NOT be taken. Mattress Bags are sold at hardware stores and online.

Compost Leaves and Yard Waste: 36 Collections Annually - Wednesdays

Place leaves, grass clippings and yard waste in biodegradable paper bags or open containers. **DO NOT** use UUT Toters. **DO NOT** use plastic bags; these collections are composted. **DO NOT** overload bags. Tree limbs (no larger than 3" diameter and 3' long) must be bundled with string/twine. Place yard waste at the curb the night before collection to ensure it will be picked up.

UUT Toters are your **PRIMARY** containers for trash and recycling collection. Place Toters at the curb the night before your collection day, and at least 3 feet apart and away from mailboxes, cars and other obstacles.

Bulk pick-up is the 3rd pick-up of the month.

DO NOT PUT CLEAN RECYCLING INTO PLASTIC BAGS – THEY ARE NOT RECYCLABLE!

Recycling is to be put directly into the recycling toter, **UNBAGGED**. If you put in plastic bags, it does not go into the single stream recycling, it's contaminated and goes to **TRASH**, **DEFEATING** the purpose of recycling and not helping the environment. Styrofoam is not recyclable.

Do you have only the (1) 64 gallon recycling Toter originally issued by the Township? Do you need additional recycling capacity? In an effort to emphasize single stream recycling and make it as convenient as possible, the Township will either swap your 64 gallon recycling Toter with a new 96 gallon recycling Toter or issue you an additional recycling Toter, all at no additional cost to you. If you are interested in additional recycling capacity, call 610-827-6033 to discuss your options.

All recyclables are to be placed directly into the recycling toter.



Recyclable materials include:

aluminum products, glass, plastic, cardboard, newspaper, magazines, periodicals, bulk mail, phone books.

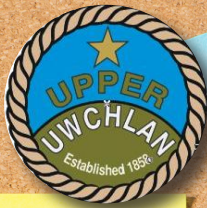
Reminder: The Township is no longer legally allowed to collect e-waste such as televisions, computers, etc.

Please note: Yard waste is not considered trash and should **NOT** be put in with your trash. Use open containers (**NO** Attached lids) or brown compost bags. If yard waste is put in trash toter, it will not be taken.

The burning of recyclable materials, to include yard waste, trees, shrubs, leaves, garbage, etc. is strictly prohibited. Burning permits are no longer issued.

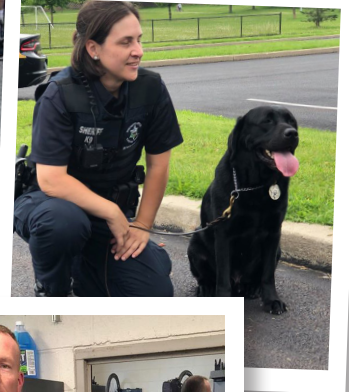

Pot Hole Problems



Everyone hates potholes. Unfortunately, they are a fact of life in Pennsylvania, thanks to our severe freeze/thaw cycle.

During the winter, crews will make road repairs when the weather permits. Because of the temperature, pothole repairs will only be temporary, using a

mixture called cold patch. Cold patch is asphalt mixed with soap, water, and fine stones. The soap and water allow the material to remain flexible so crews can work with it. After the soap and water evaporate, the material becomes hard.

How Potholes Form

Temperatures in Pennsylvania can fluctuate between freezing and mild daily during the winter months. After precipitation occurs, the water seeps into the soil below the roadway surface. When it gets colder, the precipitation freezes and the ground expands, pushing the pavement up. Then, the weather warms and the precipitation melts, leaving a gap between the pavement and ground below it. When a vehicle drives over the cavity, the pavement surface cracks, falls into the hollow space, and creates

a pothole. So, winters with a lot of precipitation (not necessarily just snow) and fluctuations in temperature often result in more potholes. *Sounds like a typical Pennsylvania winter, right?*

In the spring, the state's asphalt plants open and warm mix becomes available for more permanent repairs. The pothole is cut square, cleaned, and then treated with a tack-coat of asphalt that acts as glue. After the tack-coat application, the hot mix is placed into the pothole and compacted using a roller or other device.

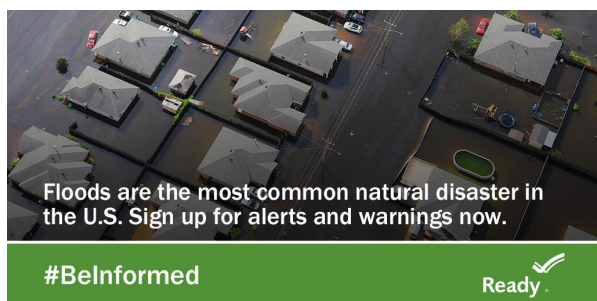

Are You Prepared for a Disaster or Emergency?

Four Simple Steps to Financial Preparedness

1. **ASSESS & COMPILE:** Gather important documents and contacts.
2. **REVIEW:** Review insurance policies and financial paperwork to be sure they are still accurate and current.
3. **SAFEGUARD:** Store paper and electronic copies of all files in safe locations.
4. **UPDATE:** Revisit and update your Emergency Financial First Aid Kit (EFFAK) often. Updates are especially important when certain changes in your life occur.

VIRUS Prevention and Treatment

Prevention: How to protect yourself

You may be able to reduce your risk of infection by doing the following:

- wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds
- avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands
- avoid close contact with people who are sick

How to Protect Others:

If you have cold-like symptoms, you can help protect others by doing the following

- stay home while you are sick
- avoid close contact with others
- cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze, then throw the tissue in the trash and wash your hands
- clean and disinfect objects and surfaces

Treatment: There are no specific treatments for illnesses caused by human viruses. Most people with common human illness will recover on their own. However, you can do some things to relieve your symptoms

- take pain and fever medications (Caution: do not give Aspirin to children)
- use a room humidifier or take a hot shower to help ease a sore throat and cough

If you are mildly sick, you should

- drink plenty of liquids
- stay home and rest

If you are concerned about your symptoms, you should see your healthcare provider.

Scoop the Poop!



Always pick up your pet's waste!

Did you know that dog poop is toxic for the health of waterways? Pet waste contains nutrients that encourage weed and algae growth. Overly fertile water becomes cloudy and green making it unattractive for swimming, boating and fishing.

Additionally, pet waste can contain fecal coliform bacteria which directly harms aquatic life and human health. Dog poop often contains antibiotics. When dog poop isn't picked up, whether in your yard or in a public area, these bacteria and medications are carried off by rain and sent directly through the stormwater system into our rivers and lakes without any treatment or filtration.

The EPA estimates that two or three days' worth of droppings from 100 dogs in a watershed can contribute enough bacteria to impact the surrounding 20 miles and make them unsafe for fishing and swimming.

There is no perfect solution for pet waste disposal but here are some of the smartest options:

- Put it in a bag and throw it in the trash. This is not the ideal solution because it can create problems at landfills or incinerators but is still better than leaving it in your yard.
- Flush it down the toilet where it will be treated before being released.
- Dig a hole or trench that is about 5 inches deep and away from vegetable gardens and any lake, stream, ditch or well. Microorganisms in the top layer of the soil will break down the waste and release nutrients to fertilize nearby plants.
- If you are away from home, look for a pet waste station where you can often find baggies and a disposal bin.
