Decomposing trash generates methane,¹ a greenhouse gas 84x more potent than CO₂ that rapidly accelerates climate change.² But when used to make compost, it not only prevents methane production, but helps to capture CO₂ from the atmosphere and reduce climate change.³

It won't pollute the environment like inorganic fertilizer,⁴ and it helps water filter through the soil, which reduces time spent watering your plants and prevents stormwater runoff.⁵

- crushed egg shells
- coffee grounds + filters
- grass clippings
- tea bags (no staples!)
- dry leaves
- shredded paper
- shredded cardboard
- wood chips
- twigs + branches
- straw
- plant stalks
